We have had another fantastic week at Mason Moor. Despite having to close the school as a result of industrial action, the children have continued to work extremely hard. Thank you to those parents who came in this morning to spend time in their childrens' classrooms, seeing what they are busy working on ahead of the Mason Moor Museum on Friday 31st March.

Reception children had an exciting week with a school trip on Tuesday to Hillier Gardens which linked to their topic of 'Spring has Sprung'. The children enjoyed exploring nature to develop their Understanding TheWorld strands. Children also took part in a celebration of the Hindu festival of Holi – they thoroughly enjoyed throwing brightly coloured paint at each other to mark this special event symbolising for Hindus the start of Spring!

Year 6 children safely returned (tired but exhilarated!) from their residential week to Osmington Bay in Dorset. They have had a wonderful time and this was an excellent opportunity for our children to build skills and resilience away from home in preparation for secondary school life and adolescence. Our overall attendance to date is 93% this is an improvement on last year where it was 89%




Reading Expectations - Every Child A Reader Every Day!






- Read yourself! It doesn't matter what it is pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. And get your children to join in – if you're cooking, could they read the recipe?
- Give books as gifts. And encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other – it'll give them a chance to read new stories, and get them all talking about what they're reading.
- Visit the local library together. It's always fun choosing new books to read, and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops – children love meeting their favourite authors.



What should I write in my child's reading record?

Listed below are some comments which may help you when writing in your child's Reading Record Book to describe how your child has read at home. It is important to record both positive and developmental comments:

- Read familiar words independently
- Able to predict what happens next in the text
- Read with good expression
- Showed good understanding of the text
- Worked out new words independently
- Worked out new words by sounding them out
- Struggled to concentrate
- He/she made a number of errors because he/she was not looking carefully enough



How often should my child read?

Your child should read every night as part of the home-school agreement and to ensure that they are developing their fluency - which is their ability to read with speed, accuracy, expression and precision.

We know that children who do not read every night do not develop a love of reading and this can prevent them from accessing the curriculum and achieving well in life.

We recommend that children read for 15-20 minutes each day.

We are getting a state-of-the-art library!

We have some exciting news to share around our plans to improve our library space to promote a love of reading and reading for pleasure across the school. Ms Brooks and Mr Constable-Phelps have secured £9,000 from National Literacy Trust and Chase Bank.

As part of this, we will shortly welcome a designer to the school who we will work with to redesign our current library space including decorative works, media visit and a broad selection of new books for all of our children. We can't wait for this to be in place, however as you can see from these pictures, things are already looking great with the addition of considerable new texts and brand new titles to include sustainability, diversity and history.

We hope that the library will become an exciting space for our children and the investment will support the children to develop a life-long love of reading.

Focus on developing pupil vocabulary

One of the school's development priorities this year is to improve writing - but to do that we need to fix issues and gaps that exist in our pupils' reading and vocabulary.

As part of our whole-school initiative to implement a vocabulary-rich environment to support children's learning, we are working hard on our learning areas to ensure all key vocabulary including an image representation of these words are accessible for children to refer to daily.

Understanding DOMESTIC violence/abuse

Witnessing domestic abuse is child abuse. If you're worried about a child, tell us so that we can get them to safety.

Domestic abuse is any type of controlling, bullying, threatening or violent behaviour between people in a relationship. It can seriously harm children and young people and witnessing domestic abuse is child abuse. It can happen inside or outside the home, over the telephone, online, social media and both men and women can be abused.

Types of abuse include:

Kicking, hitting, punching, rape, controlling someone's finances, controlling someone's behaviour or life, not letting someone leave the house or answer a phone alone.

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE AT MASON MOOR PRIMARY SCHOOL

Mason Moor, staff and pupils are committed to Safeguarding and Promoting the Welfare of all its pupils. Each pupil's welfare is of paramount importance.

All staff are supported by a Designated Safeguarding Lead who is accountable for all aspects of Child Protection and Safeguarding. This is Mr Daniel Constable Pholps.

Please report any of the following to a Safeguarding Team member immediately:

- Any suspicion that a child has an injury, mark, or bruise in any way and that is not readily attributable to the normal knocks and scrapes received in play.
- Any explanation given that is inconsistent or appears suspicious.
- Any behaviours which give rise to suspicions that a child may have suffered harm.
- Any concerns that a child may be suffering from inadequate care, ill treatment, or emotional mistreatment.
- Any concerns that a child is presenting signs or symptoms of abuse or neglect.
- Any significant changes in a child's presentation, including non-attendance.
- Any hint or disclosure of abuse.
- · Any concerns regarding person(s) who may pose a risk to children.
- Information which indicates that a child is living with someone who does not have parental responsibility.

This school pays full regard to the 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' guidance issued by the DFE in 2002.

All incidents of bullying including those involving e-safety should be reported and will be managed through our arti-bullying procedures.

The school complies fully with the 2022 owners guidance for Keeping Children Safe in Education. This means we expect all pupils and staff to:

- · Work in an open and transparent way:

All staff receive safeguarding training periodically throughout the year.

The school has established positive working practices with external agencies and within Southematon City Council.





Staffing Update

We have been busily recruiting new, experienced teachers, to take over from these staff members who will return to their own school at different points during the year.



Knowledge Organisers

On our website, under the CURRICULUM heading you can see knowledge organisers that show what we want pupils to KNOW and REMEMBER by the end of the current term.

The knowledge organiser helps you to understand what the key points have been in your child's learning. Have you had a look at them with your child? Perhaps teasing out some of vocabulary and its meaning?

Every child should submit an entry

- We will support your child by providing access to school resources to help their submission. This includes: glue, paints, printing off items to stick onto the exhibit, card and paper.
- We will help your child with their project.
 In after-school club, or drop-in to see the class teacher.
- You could spend the next few weekends on the project together. Family time dedicated to helping your child's learning. Just 20-30 minutes per day over the weekend could help make something incredible to displayed at our school!

- Have a look at the current unit of study in Science, History, Art & Design, Geography, Music and more.
- Look at the key vocabulary your child is learning in this unit - could you include it onto the exhibit?
- Think about the key knowledge your child is learning.



Why do we do the Museum each term?

The exhibition helps your child's teacher to understand how well they have learned, remembered and applied their new knowledge.

The exhibits demonstrate not just their creative ability - but show us how deeply committed their learning has been.

Why is this important?

Sometimes. Quizzes, assessments and tests do not provide us with a full or true understanding of a child's ability. A child may be worried about a test and not perform as well, or they may be shy and reserved in talking about their learning - this helps to combat that.

Learning at Mason Moor this week:



This week, Reception students have started to learn about subtraction. We have begun to explore what the symbols mean and how to solve number sentences. We have continued to explore adjectives to make our writing more interesting and on Friday we learnt about St Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland and the festival of Holi. In the afternoon on Friday we played Holi, welcoming spring by throwing coloured powders. It was a lot of fun to learn about and experience a festival from a culture different from ours.



On Friday last week we started our new book - Supertato - and made our own Supertato heroes. We had lots of fun making them, using straws, felt, paper, cocktail sticks and pipe cleaners. In maths we are learning about capacity and volume and the difference between them. We are using full, nearly full, half full, nearly empty and empty to describe the volume of containers. We are ordering containers by capacity and using non-standard units to check the capacity of containers. In Geography we are learning about land use in Alice Springs and how it relates to the economy. In History we are learning about Sir Francis Drake and his battle against the Spanish Armada.



This week in writing we have been looking at the word innovate and applying this to our text of Jack and the Beanstalk. Children have begun to make their own adaptations to the traditional story. Thinking about character changes, location changes and how the story may end. For example instead of having a giant some children have changed it to a shark or a sea monster. They have then changed the plant that grows to seaweed or a giant carrot! In reading we continue to delve deeper into Jack and the Beanstalk, thinking about what the moral of the story is and how the narrative could change based on the perspective of other characters. In maths we begin to look at time. We have looked at 'o'clock' and 'half past' on an analogue clock. It would be great for children to continue to practise this skill at home. If you have an analogue clock at home then get your children to tell you the time if it is 'o'clock' or half past.



This week, Year 3 have been focusing on using our previous knowledge of fractions to find equivalent fractions. Children have been understanding a fraction wall and applying their number knowledge to spot patterns whilst also using multiplication and division to find fractions of the same amount. In writing, children have been planning their own short story from our class book, The Diver's Daughter, which has been lovely hearing the children's wonderful ideas. In Science we have been learning about the purpose and impact of magnetic fields and recapping on what metals are



Iln Year 4 this week, in PE we have been learning how to use a rugby pass with the correct technique in a game situation with defenders around us. On Friday we had a brilliant time creating our projects for the Mason Moor Museum, utilising our knowledge from multiple areas of the curriculum, such as writing, reading and geography and Science. In Maths we have been adding and subtracting fractions. In Writing we have been posing as members of the WWF "World Wide Fund for Nature", planning and writing our explanation texts,

magnetic and non-magnetic. In Geography we have further compared different settlements and focused on how a specific settlement had changed over a period of time. aimed to explain to people how to prevent the pollution of our sea shores. Lastly, in geography we have been learning about how long shore drift, its irreversible effects on cliffs and ways to prevent erosion.



This week, Year 5 has begun creating our satellites for our Winchester Science project. They've made a great start in producing their satellites, ready to continue to make them next week. Please bring in any more recyclable materials to continue our project (we need tin foil, tape and shiny objects).

Also returning to swimming this week, they continued developing their skills of swimming on their backs using a float board on their front for stability. Remembering when swimming on their backs they need to keep their toes up. It's been lovely to see how their confidence has grown from week to week and now they are always willing to try the new skill of the week.

We have some great trips happening over the next couple of weeks so keep your eyes peeled for our amazing news.



While some children in Year 6 were away on the residential trip, those who stayed at school soaked up more learning and took part in a week immersed in Inca's, fossils, Mary Anning and adaptation.

We further explored Evolution and Natural Selection in our Science topic. The children edited their beautiful biographies, which they had written about Charles Darwin, in writing. In Geography, they examined the challenges of living in Favela, Brazil and wrote a letter to the Brazilian government asking for social change! We look forward to welcoming back our Osmington Bay friends next week!
