The triangular trade was the sailing route taken by British slave traders. It was a journey of three stages:

- 1. Britain to West Africa
- 2. West Africa across the Atlantic to the West Indies (middle passage)
- 3. West Indies back to Britain


Slave ships used to carry salves through the middle passage. This was the most harrowing part of the slave trade – over 1 million died during the


journey.
