Vertical Tutoring

This year, we have started to do vertical tutoring and launched this on our first day back with lots of fun ,ice cream and bouncy castles! It's growing into an important part of our school, so here's a little information about it...

What is it?

Vertical tutoring is a way of encouraging children up and down the school to get to know their peers from other year groups. Each 'tutor' group has a mixture of children from years 1-6. We want to promote positive working relationships between the children and, because we are a smaller school, we want to foster an even better sense of community between our children.

The older pupils will develop an increased sense of responsibility working alongside their younger peers, and our younger pupils will have a larger pool of people to aspire to as they grow up.

These sessions will work on securing our school core values through communication, teamwork, resilience, and respect of others.

Each tutor group has its own name, inspired by trailblazers that have made a difference to the world: Greta Thunberg, Mo Farah, David Attenborough, Rosa Parks, Mother Teresa, and Steve Jobs.

When is it and what might we be doing this term?

Thursday mornings: this will be a shared reading session. The older pupils will be fantastic at helping our younger members make sense of their new reading books.

Friday afternoons: project time. Groups will be creating various art projects in honour of their group name.

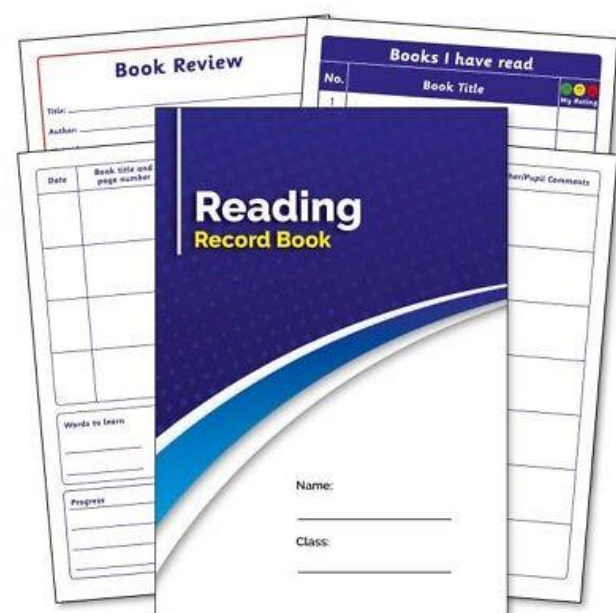

Reading Expectations - Please help your child!



Top tips for encouraging reading:

- **Read yourself!** It doesn't matter what it is – pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. And get your children to join in – if you're cooking, could they read the recipe?
- **Give books as gifts.** And encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other – it'll give them a chance to read new stories, and get them all talking about what they're reading.
- **Visit the local library together.** It's always fun choosing new books to read, and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops – children love meeting their favourite authors.



What should I write in my child's reading record?

Listed below are some comments which may help you when writing in your child's Reading Record Book to describe how your child has read at home. It is important to record both positive and developmental comments:

- Read familiar words independently
- Able to predict what happens next in the text
- Read with good expression
- Showed good understanding of the text
- Worked out new words independently
- Worked out new words by sounding them out
- Struggled to concentrate
- He/she made a number of errors because he/she was not looking carefully enough



How often should my child read?

Your child should read every night as part of the home-school agreement and to ensure that they are developing their **fluency** - which is their ability to read with speed, accuracy, expression and precision.

We know that children who do not read every night do not develop a love of reading and this can prevent them from accessing the curriculum and achieving well in life.

We recommend that children read for **15-20 minutes** each day.

Learning at Mason Moor this week:

RECEPTION

This week in reception we have been learning about Black History. We have watched an episode of Jojo and Gran Gran where Gran Gran talks about her journey to England from St Lucia and the special item she brings with her. We then brought in or spoke about special items we have at home and school. We have also learnt about Kente patterns and made our own by weaving paper together as well as collaborating together to make a class one with string stamps we made ourselves.

In year 1 this week, we have been learning about Mary Seacole and why she is famous. The children have made some lovely sculptures out of tin foil which we can wait to show to the parents.

Year 2



This week has been black history week. We have been learning all about the civil rights movement, including what Rosa Park did. We also learned about how djembe drums are made. We have been practising our drumming skills and will be doing a performance on Friday to share with everyone what we have learned.

We have been writing amazing diary entries on tea-stained paper and creating posters in our history lessons. In maths we have been learning all about factors and multiples, and we really enjoyed having parents in to see us learning on Thursday!

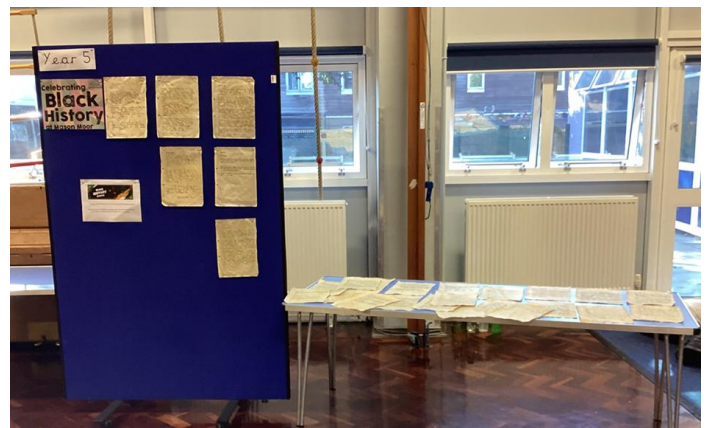
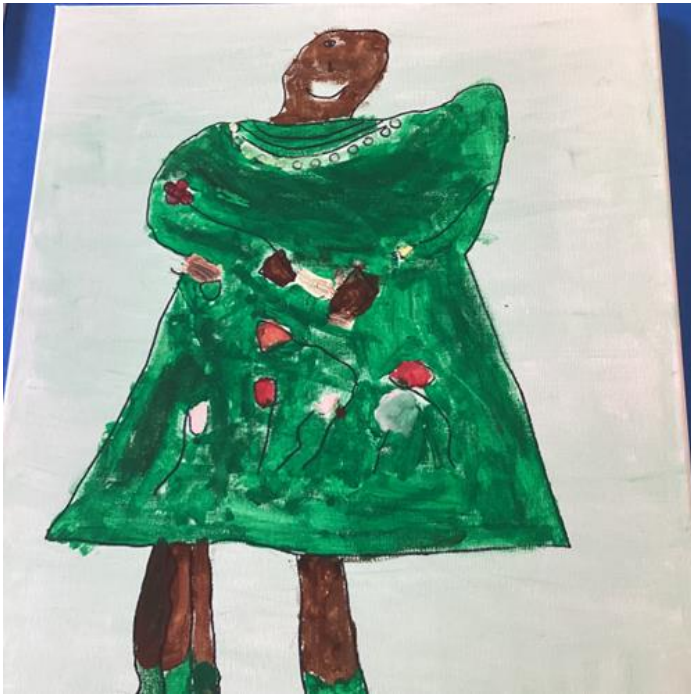
