This is a wonderful way for our children at Mason Moor to make a real impact on our community and wider.

Year group	Our charity and why
R	Family Fund — "We want to help children and families that don't have very much money. We want everyone to have a happy life."
1	Children in Need – "We want to help children our age when they are struggling and need help."
2	Crisis – "Our class wants people to have food and drink. We want people to be safe."
3	NSPCC – "We care about other children and we know that the NSPCC have been in our school to help us learn about being safe."
4	<b>WWF</b> – "WWF helps animals and we don't want animals to be unsafe, hurt or trapped. Hopefully we can help animals in the jungles."
5	Make a Wish – "Sometimes people aren't very well and Make a Wish helps children feel better. Some people we know are helping the charity and want to make people's lives better."
6	Cool Earth - "I want the Earth to be cooler. At the moment, the water is rising, and this is causing flooding. If we don't get the world cooler, we won't be able to enjoy lots of the things we like now – it is important to help the planet."

All attendance fell this week, so please rest well over half term and we will see you all fresh and full of enthusiasm when you get back.




Remember: if your child has a cold, please send them in.

Reading Expectations - Please help your child! Reading log need to be bought in daily







### Top tips for encouraging reading:

- Read yourself! It doesn't matter what it is pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. And get your children to join in – if you're cooking, could they read the recipe?
- Give books as gifts. And encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other – it'll give them a chance to read new stories, and get them all talking about what they're reading.
- Visit the local library together. It's always fun choosing new books to read, and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops – children love meeting their favourite authors.

### What should I write in my child's reading record?

Listed below are some comments which may help you when writing in your child's Reading Record Book to describe how your child has read at home. It is important to record both positive and developmental comments:

- Read familiar words independently
- Able to predict what happens next in the text
- Read with good expression
- Showed good understanding of the text
- Worked out new words independently
- Worked out new words by sounding them out
- Struggled to concentrate
- He/she made a number of errors because he/she was not looking carefully enough

### How often should my child read?

Your child should read every night as part of the home-school agreement and to ensure that they are developing their fluency - which is their ability to read with speed, accuracy, expression and precision.

We know that children who do not read every night do not develop a love of reading and this can prevent them from accessing the curriculum and achieving well in life.

We recommend that children read for 15-20 minutes each day.

### Learning at Mason Moor this week:



We have been enjoying our new outdoor area that has such a range of outdoor activities and apparatus that have helped us with our physical development. We have enjoyed using our bikes around the new track and using our maths skills to think about how fast we can make it round. In writing we have looked at the stickman and begun sequencing the story in the correct order. In maths we have worked really hard on weight and length and making sure that we can begin thinking about measuring accurately.



This week we have been looking at different Planets. We have learned about Jupiter and Saturn and have planned and written stories that have wowed Mrs Wood. In Maths we have been learning about our number bonds to 20 and we have looked at odd and even numbers.



Year 2 has not only adapted to having new teachers but has also adapted to all the topics thrown at them this week. From finding living, dead and never being alive things to understanding the ancient Egyptians, they have mastered it all. They have learned so many new pieces of vocabulary, ask them the new language for a story and 'fixing a problem'. I am confident they will impress you as much as they have impressed me.



Year 3 have had a fab week! They have continued honing in on their swimming skills and are making great progress. We have started our new Science topic on light. They learnt about natural and man-made light sources. We discussed if they were reflective or non-reflective sources of light. The children enjoyed making predictions using their knowledge of reflective/non-reflective materials ahead of our test and practical session next week!



This week in year 4, we have been very excited to use the VR headsets to investigate ancient Rome! We got to explore different sites and look at these giant structures from the lowly perspective of a mere mortal. We have also learned even more about the different states of matter, and about some of the biomes in Russia! Russia is so big that there are even more biomes to learn about next week, too! Oh, and we are really enjoying our swimming - some of us are much better already; we've even overcome some of our fears!



In Year 5 this week we have been learning all about life in the Navy during the 1700s! We've also enjoyed exploring our new book, The Arrival! We've discussed what it may be



Throughout the week, year 6 have been completing practice SATs papers. They have needed to show resilience throughout the week especially when questions

like to have to move to a new country, and how we would get by if we could not speak the language. In maths we have been learning all about area! We are looking forward to moving onto fractions next week. have been tricky at times. We have been impressed with the attitude they have had to the papers. This will help us in being able to move forward with our learning in the future weeks ahead. We want to wish year 6 a restful weekend break.
