Swimming

Morning registration

Every morning in class all children will be offered breakfast. It is called Maslow's hierarchy of needs. Children start on the bottom level and then build up the triangle once each need is met. If a need is not met in a section then that cannot access the next. This should highlight the importance of eating breakfast first thing in the morning.




Football Match Vs St Mary's

Remember: if your child has a cold, please send them in.



Reading Expectations - Please help your child! Reading log need to be bought in daily



Top tips for encouraging reading:

- Read yourself! It doesn't matter what it is pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. And get your children to join in – if you're cooking, could they read the recipe?
- Give books as gifts. And encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other it'll give them a chance to read new stories, and get them all talking about what they're reading.
- Visit the local library together. It's always fun choosing new books to read, and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops – children love meeting their favourite authors.



What should I write in my child's reading record?

Listed below are some comments which may help you when writing in your child's Reading Record Book to describe how your child has read at home. It is important to record both positive and developmental comments:

- Read familiar words independently
- Able to predict what happens next in the text
- Read with good expression
- Showed good understanding of the text
- Worked out new words independently
- Worked out new words by sounding them out
- Struggled to concentrate
- He/she made a number of errors because he/she was not looking carefully enough



How often should my child read?

Your child should read every night as part of the home-school agreement and to ensure that they are developing their fluency - which is their ability to read with speed, accuracy, expression and precision.

We know that children who do not read every night do not develop a love of reading and this can prevent them from accessing the curriculum and achieving well in life.

We recommend that children read for 15-20 minutes each day.



Learning at Mason Moor this week:



This week in EYFS, we have been learning about subtraction in maths! We have been learning the 'th', 'sh' and 'ng' sounds over the week! In reading, we have been reading about Goldilocks and Three Bears! In writing, we have been thinking about our families and learning about where we are from: a great celebration of ourselves!

Maple class

This week in Maple class, we have been learning about so much! We have looked at fractions in maths, present tense in writing and practised our reading. We have all been out and about with the year groups at Mason Moor and we have really enjoyed the topic learning that we have completed alongside the other children at Mason Moor!



In year 1 this week, we have completed an explanation text on the Earth - linking to our VR headset last week! In maths, we have been working on our number bonds to 20- we have been looking at subtraction and addition facts relating to this. We also opened our doors to many parents on Friday, welcoming them in for reading whilst we ate breakfast!



In year 2 this week, we went to London Zoo! We saw penguins, tigers, gorillas and lost of creepy crawlies! We have been writing a setting description linked to our book, A perfect spot'. We've also learned a lot more about Ancient Egypt! We've learned all about hieroglyphics and this has encompassed all of reading, history and art!



We have been up to quite a bit this week in year 3! We have been learning about Qin Shi Huang, an old Chinese emperor: he became an emperor when he was 13 and put his mum in prison! He also got the peasants of the land to build the Great Wall of China that still stands so impressively today! In maths, we have been learning all about fractions. We didn't realise just how important these are to our understanding of the everyday!



Another really busy week for us in Year 4! We have been learning about 2-d shapes and getting to know their properties! In writing, we have been putting our skills together to create a fantastic setting description of an Ancient Roman city - we started at the busy forum and ventured into the surrounding streets! In geography, we have continued to learn about the biomes of Russia; this week, we looked at the tundra. A very cold place, but full of fascinating facts and animals!



This week, we have started our swimming. This has been great fun and we have really enjoyed ourselves! In science, we have been learning about air resistance and gravity - we now understand just why parachutes actually work! In writing, we have been writing letters to characters in our book The Arrival - getting into character has been great fun as we are understanding how people might feel when they visit a new place!



This week, we have gone into two different classes to learn all about fractions as well as our new Macbeth unit!

In science, we have been continuing to learn about electrical circuits. The most exciting experience this week has been swimming! We have really enjoyed going out to the pool each day and working on our skills in the water!
