
PE Days

Learning at Mason Moor:



This week in Nursery the children have continued with the topic 'All About Me' alongside of their new Story 'Brown Bear Brown Bear what do you see?'. The children have been learning different ways to count and using visual representations to aid them. All children have explored colours this week and the magic of what happens when you mix them together. Please share any pictures/videos on Tapestry this weekend of your children counting, looking at their books or going on a colour hunt.



In the Ark this week, we have been doing lots of tipping and pouring using porridge oats and glitter, counting dinosaurs, and learning to group objects into groups of big and small. This is to support our fine and gross motor development, and our maths learning.



This week we have continued to explore Dinosaurs and have been making comparisons between them. In Writing we have been exploring finger spaces. We are trying to remember to leave them between our words and are making great progress. In Maths we have been looking at addition, adding zero and using number tracks. One of our favourite memories from this week was to go outside and jump, splash and kick around in puddles - it was a fantastic sensory experience, and we can't wait to go again!



This week we have learnt about Scotland, we have looked at the countryside as well as the traditions of Scotland. In Maths we have been learning to order and compare numbers to 50 including finding the difference.

Year 2



This week year 2 have written a setting description about a Chinese village. We included expanded noun phrases within our clauses. In science we completed an experiment to test if materials were absorbent.

In Year 3 this week, students worked incredibly hard on math skills. They persevered and used lots of concrete resources to help embed the skill. In writing this week, the Dragon and King Arthur. We set up a pretend campfire soar as they embarked on crafting their own narratives of outlaw adventures, igniting a passion for storytelling.



For this week, we have been doing our independent write on the story of the lost thing. We have been using our skills based around adjectives, verbs, noun phrases and fronted adverbials where year 4 have been learning about a narrative to write an alternative ending or change the character for the story. As a class we have modelled together the beginning and middle and been discussing what has happened in the book, where the story is set, who the characters are and how it feels when losing lost things.

Year 4

In Year 5 this week we have started our new writing journey! We have been learning more about why we remember and reflect on Holocaust Memorial Day. We also have been doing lots of experiments, exploring which materials dissolve in water!

Year 6

This week, Year 6 have been writing their independent writes for a narrative with an invasion. They had lots of wonderful ideas which have made their narratives flow well when reading them. In Maths, the children have worked so hard on being able to achieve calculating long division. Well scary when first looking but there was so much resilience in the room that they kept on trying. With test week next week, this resilience will be wonderful for the children to be able to try their best.

Also look out for a letter going out for London History Museum school trip and Saturday School. Look forward to seeing you all Monday. This week in maple class we have been focusing on subtracting using the column method. we started by subtracting two-digit numbers and towards the end of the week we had moved onto subtracting 3-digit numbers and being able to regroup and exchange! In English this week pupils looked at using contractions and the purpose of the apostrophe. In our Big Write session this week we focused on alliteration. We used thesaurus to think of different words that started with the same initial sound and then used these alliterations to produce our own alliteration poems about winter. Some children were very brave a read their poems to their classmates.
