



Vocabulary	Meaning
Last Supper	the last meal of Jesus and his disciples on the evening before the crucifixion
Holy Week	the week immediately before Easter Sunday
crucifixion	a method of execution in which the person is tied or nailed to a cross
resurrection	a return to life after death
salvation	the act of being saved from sin or evil In terms of the Easter story, Jesus's death and resurrection opened up the way back to God and restored humanity's relationship with him.
sin	purposely disobeying the rules (in this case rules of God)
redemption	being rescued from sin
sacrifice	the act of giving up something of great value to show loyalty or deep affection, the gift of giving something to a god is an act of worship

### Key knowledge – Holy Week

**Palm Sunday:** Holy Week begins, on this day, Jesus arrived in Jerusalem, crowds gathered, waving palm branches and shouting "Hosanna!". The people were very pleased to see him.

**Maundy Thursday:** Jesus was going to celebrate the Passover with his twelve disciples. This meal will be known as The Last Supper. Judas, one of Jesus' disciples had betrayed him.

**Good Friday:** Jesus was taken by Roman Soldiers after Judas showed who he was. The soldiers were cruel to him, and they put a crown of thorns on his head. Jesus was later crucified on the hill between two other prisoners. Jesus' body was placed in a tomb and a large stone was rolled across the entrance.

**Easter Sunday:** In the morning, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb. When she arrived, she saw that the stone had been rolled away and Jesus was gone. Mary was overjoyed and ran to tell the disciples what had happened.
