Learning at Mason Moor:

Nursery

This week the children have found a deeper meaning to the story 'Goldilocks and the three bears' through exploring the emotions of the characters and connecting them to their own feelings. The children have really enjoyed this story and have explored all areas of learning, both indoors and outdoors.

The Ark

This week we have enjoyed moving to stage 2 of Attention Autism which has involved dripping paint and splatting shaving foam!! In the hall we have had fun playing with a parachute.

Year R

Reception have enjoyed the exciting experience of Bike ability this week. They have been amazing listeners and shown great determination and improvement across the sessions. In Maths we have been exploring halving and doubling whilst in Literacy writing lessons we have been describing the main characters from our class story 'The Way Back Home'. We have been trying to up skill our vocabulary by finding different and more interesting ways to describe our characters feelings. We went from scared to worried to frightened and terrified. We then used our fantastic phonics to try writing these big words!

Year 1

This week Year 1 have been learning about litres and millilitres, We have found the capacity of different jugs in litres. In History we have learnt about Helen Sharman (the first British person in Space) We learnt about different landmarks in Australia including the Sydney Opera House and the Uluru which changes colour at different times of the day.

Year 2

This week, Year 2 have been learning the story of King Arthur and his knights of the round table. We retold the story in small groups learning how to project our voices clearly to a small audience. In maths, we have continued to learn about fractions and can now identify thirds.

Year

In Year 3 we have been learning to improve our writing with adverbials of time and continuing to practise our new multiplication strategies in maths. In geography we are learning about different types of settlements, what we might find in each type, and which we would prefer to live in.

In Year 4 this week we have been using the VR Headsets to think about the ways we can describe lighthouses. We have been thinking about using more powerful words by up levelling our vocabulary choices. In Art, we have been learning about overlapping to create a collage.

This week, we were very lucky to have our final visit from the Winchester Science Centre! We were able to show off our finished satellites in this workshop and put them to the test against heat and vibration to see if they survived. We also really enjoyed presenting all of the work we have been doing recently in our class assembly. It meant that we could talk to parents about all of the workshops we have been taking part in! In our other lessons we have been learning about natural disasters such as volcano eruptions and earthquakes, and how they impact the people in affected areas. We are looking forward to continuing our learning next week, when we will be learning more about the life cycles of different animals in science!

Year 6

This week has been mock SATs week for Year 6 which thankfully are the last set of tests before the actual ones in May. The children all tried hard to do their best, which we are all very proud of. In English, writing has continued through our reading text "The Explorer". Children have been writing setting descriptions using figurative language to describe the plane that came down in the Amazon Rainforest. Fractions have continued in Maths and our history topic of the Inca Civilisation has prompted some good question about their daily lives: where they lived, the jobs they did, the gods and the lives of a commoner. In Science, our topic of Evolution and Inheritance has continued, thinking about Charles Darwin and how humans and other living things have changed and evolved over time.

Maple Class

On Monday Maple class came to Springwell main site to watch a theatre performance of The Wind and the Willows. It was a great show and all the pupils enjoyed watching the performance. At the end the actors allowed the pupils to explore the props and this included some of the puppets. On Friday Maple class will be coming over to main site again to watch Prizin Hands Easter performance. In maths number we have been focusing on using the grid method to answer multiplication number sentences and we have also been looking at arrays. In English we have been looking at using bullet points to form a list, our phonics sound that we are working on for this week and relative clauses. Some pupils have had the opportunity to learn a new skill of riding a bicycle and focusing on road safety. All the children that took part in this worked really hard on their balancing skills and avoiding obstacles. Well done Maple class!




Sign of the Week

Reading




Read yourself! It doesn't matter what it is – pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. And get your children to join in – if you're cooking, could they read the recipe?

Top tips for encouraging reading:

Visit the local library together. It's always fun choosing new books to read and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops – children love meeting their favourite authors.

Give books as gifts. And encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other – it'll give them a chance to read new stories and get them all talking about what they're reading.




What should I write in my child's reading record?

Listed below are some comments which may help you when writing in your child's Reading Record Book to describe how your child has read at home. It is important to record both positive and developmental comments:

Read familiar words independently.

- Able to predict what happens next in the text.
- Read with good expression.
- Showed good understanding of the text.
- Worked out new words independently.
- Worked out new words by sounding them out.
- Struggled to concentrate.
- He/she made several errors because he/she was not looking carefully enough



How often should my child read?

Your child should read every night as part of the home-school agreement and to ensure that they are developing their fluency - which is their ability to read with speed, accuracy, expression and precision.

We know that children who do not read every night do not develop a love of reading and this can prevent them from accessing the curriculum and achieving well in life. We recommend that children read for 20 minutes each day.

Other News Coats As the weather is still variable and wet,, please can we remind parents that children still need a coat in school every day. Even if it appears sunny in the morning, rain showers and cold windy periods can still occur during break. lunch and PE lessons when children are outside. We have had incidents this week where vehicles have been parked across our main gate and the children's crossing to our school. If we see people in the vehicle, we will politely ask them to move on however please rest assured, we are monitoring this situation to ensure safety for our children. The council have also been in touch and are considering closing off the road (except for residents and access) at the start and end of the school day. **ABSENCE** A reminder that if your child is absent from school you must call the office by 9am to inform them of why they are absent from school. Failure to do this can result in an unauthorised absence from school. If you have 10 or more unauthorised absences you may be issued with a £60 fixed penalty notice. School Uniform Please can we remind parents and carers that even though the weather is warm, our school uniform policy still applies. No child should be wearing open-toed shoes to school - we need to keep our feet safe! If not branded, all T/Polo shirts should be of school colour (white or blue). When it is your child's PE day, they can come dressed in PE kit however the same rules apply. All children should wear T-shirts with sleeves to cover their neck

and shoulders to protect against the sun (no vests or strappy tops please).
