Guru Nanak showed sewa, or selfless service, in many ways. Once, he saw a village suffering from drought. He helped dig a well, providing water to the people. Another time, he visited a poor man's house and washed his feet, showing love and respect for everyone, no matter their status.



He also taught that sharing is important. Once, he shared food with hungry travellers, even though he had little. His actions inspired others to help those in need.

Guru Nanak's sewa taught people to be kind and helpful to others. He showed that even small acts of kindness can make a big difference. His teachings inspire people to serve others and make the world a better place.
