Year 1 British History: Iron Age Celts

| Vocabulary | Meaning |
|--------------------|--|
| tribe | a group of people – families, clans or generations |
| celts | all of the people who lives in Britain and Northwest Europe during the Iron Age |
| Europe | a continent that contains Britain |
| migrate | to move from one country to another |
| enclosure | a space that is closed in |
| hill fort | an ancient settlement usually on a hill |
| settlement | a community of people living in the same area |
| rampart | a defensive wall |
| round house | a circular building people lived in |
| cauldron | a large cooking pot |
| thatch | to make a roof using dried plant material |
| wattle and daub | a type of wall that was made using sticks with clay and mud |
| crops | plants that are grown as food to eat |
| preserve | to stop something getting old or rotting |
| grindPR | to crush down into tiny pieces |
| brooch | a jewel that is held on clothes by a pin |
| tunic | a piece of clothing worn without sleeves reaching to the knees |

Key knowledge – Keeping areas well protected



This is a **rampart** – a wall protecting the town

During the Iron Age, people moved into and around Britain.

To keep towns safe, ramparts were created to shield the local people from outsiders.

This wall is strong.

Key knowledge - Where did the Iron Age Celt's live?



This is a round house

The Iron Age Celt's lived in round houses. They were buildings with one room.

In the middle of the room was a cauldron which had a fire underneath for cooking.
